BUDDING CELEBRITY CHEF:
John Silvia, an eighth-grader at
Bridgewater Middle School,
knows his way around the
kitchen — and in front of a
camera. Combining these skills
earned him a top culinary honor and a school visit from a TV
chef to talk about his winning
ways.

Silva was one of four students nationwide to win the "What's Your Specialty?" recipe and video contest hosted by Chartwells School Dining Services.

"It was really awesome," Silvia said by phone about winning the contest. "I play sports, so winning is nothing new to me, but this is really a great honor."

He won for his recipe, "John's Fruit Salad Minis," which consists of fresh fruits and nuts, topped with a mixture of tahini and maple syrup. He concocted it all with ease on camera, filming in his grandparents' kitchen, he said.

"I cook all the time, especially on weekends when my parents sleep late," he said. "Both sides of my family have very skilled cooks. I learned a lot from them, I'm completely blessed by that."

Among his rewards was a school visit from **Jet Tila**, who has appeared on cooking shows such as "Iron Chef" and "Chopped."

"He's laid back, a fun guy," Silva said of Tila. "He was like a guest star at our school, handing out prizes. He's a really nice guy."

And one the young man wouldn't mind following into the culinary trades.

"Cooking is definitely in my future," he said. "Obviously, I have to keep my grades up, and sports are a priority, but after this, cooking bounced up to the top priority. I'd like to become a TV chef."

"John did a fantastic job emulating a real cooking show like you see on TV," said **Eric De- Lisle**, food service director for the Bridgewater-Raynham School District, in a phone interview. "He did exactly what you'd expect a professional chef to do, he even had commercial breaks. He just did a great job."

Silvia loves cooking with his grandmother, he said, "who taught me to make frittata, one of my specialties. She's a native of Puerto Rico, and taught me the Spanish version."

His winning video shows him in his grandparents' kitchen, in black apron, all the ingredients apportioned on a cutting board. He sets about slicing them up, putting them in a bowl and stirring in the syrup and tahini, then doling it out into dessert glasses, all with aplomb. The contest was his first cooking competition, but won't be his last, he said, as he plans to enter all he can.

"I heard not many kids come out of our school winning something nationally," he said. "I feel good being one of the first, and about representing my school."
